Throughout our Centers and our places of presence, sisters, associates, friends and neighbors joined with Network, the Lobby for Catholic Social Justice, to call on senators to vote to pass the For the People Act, a bill that would ensure equal access to the ballot for all voters. Across the congregation, people held witness, called their Senators and signed petitions to support the bill. In West Virginia, a media event drew public attention to the bill, and constituents contacted Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia, voicing their support of the need for the bill to pass.

The bill, if passed, would put in place a law to protect the inviolability of the vote and voters' rights in our country. The For the People Act would provide federal protection of basic voter rights in all states.







Sr. Annie Ramagos also presented the principal with a S. Mary Southard art print for the school.

In Baton Rouge, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held at Highland Elementary to reopen the newly refurbished sports areas. As CSJ Sisters and Associates, our charism embraces the desire "to serve the dear neighbor without distinction." Each year a service project is planned by our Medaille Sisters and Associates, and in January 2020, the service committee identified the needs of Highland Elementary as our next project.

We began to develop a plan to replace basketball backboards on the playground so that the children could have a more enjoyable outdoor play experience. Plans were put on hold, however, when Covid 19 restrictions were implemented.

During spring 2021, we began to explore how we might best continue the project. After a passionate plea, a few generous donors provided funds to replace 6 basketball hoops and backboards and 2 soccer goals. At the outset of the proposed project, we had worked with former principal, **Justin Robicheaux**, and now at the project's completion, we are finishing with current principal, Ms. **Sharon Thomas**.

The students are blessed to have these dedicated educators in their lives. As many Associates and a few Sisters have volunteered at Highland Elementary over the years, we are thrilled that this service project will have a positive impact at Highland Elementary by providing a nice play area for our 'little neighbors' for many years to come.
